Diary of the 2024 Centenary Year for Mayne Tigers AFC


Mayne Tigers embarked on their Centenary Year with the hope that all the celebrations would go well and that people, players and supporters would enjoy the memories provided by the various events.

The centre-piece event was the Hall of Fame dinner which was held on Friday May 24th at the Kedron-Wavell RSL club. The event was to honour all those who had over the years put in honourable service for the Tigers or who had won awards of substance since the formation of the club in 1924. More about this later.

The season and the year kicked off on Saturday 16th March with the season launch and the unveiling of the Centenary Banner. The Banner prepared by SIgnBlast Pty Ltd was put together by Dick Fell with photos from *The Tigers From Glory to Heartbreak*, from Russell and Ann Ditchburn's extensive collection, from all the photos collected by Bob Gower for the history book and from his own collection of photos. There are 216 pictures and they include all the Premiership teams from Senior and Junior levels, team photos of special teams, like the inaugural women's team and then photos of people, players and places that have significance for the club, as well as all the individuals that are featured. It is fair to say that the Centenary Banner had an impact at the launch and at all the home games during the season.

It will have a lasting impact as it can be stored and brought out as needed over the years. A simple listing of all the names is also on hand to ensure that future Mayne Tigers are aware of who is featured on the Banner. It complements the Hall of Fame personalities.

The season in brief - 2024

Pardon the interruption but the Hall of Fame dinner was held on the Friday night before the next round of matches. The event was timed so that current day players would be able to attend and of course assist with the smooth operation of the night. Football was rescheduled for Sunday with all four games played at home.

Inaugural Hall of Fame inducts 273 Mayne Tigers people (and places)

Nearly 400 Mayne supporters, friends and players attended the inaugural Hall of Fame Dinner which was held on **Friday May 24**th at Kedron-Wavell RSL club. The dinner was an enormous success as everyone on the Tiger crew found people and players that they hadn't seen for years and the general buzz of conversation was loud and the night full of fun.



There were four sessions of induction that the organisers had set up, each session had about 40 inductees and they were given a plaque to commemorate their inclusion and a Hall of Fame Dinner brochure. These inductees were received with applause and with everyone's full attention. The sessions were well organised by committee members and players alike – the MCs Shane Johnson and Bart Sinclair were able to fill in details for most of the people coming across the stage and the whole exercise went like clockwork. The audience was fully

engaged and not bored at any stage.

Eventually170 people were inducted into the Hall of Fame on the night. Where an

inductee had died – they were often represented on the podium by family members. And the Hall of Famers come from all walks of the Mayne Tigers Football Club, senior and junior.

The inductees also were given a Mayne Tigers Centenary Celebration Souvenir Booklet 1924-2024 to take away. This booklet has a pen picture of all the 280 inductees into the Mayne Tigers AFC Hall of Fame. It also has the criteria for selecting the Hall of Famers that applied rigour to the selection process.



Group interviews punctuated the proceedings with luminaries like Barry Spring, Don Barber, Glenda Barber and Jim Hayes from the 50s and 60s. Gary Maddison, Dale Woodhall, Howard Neilson, and Bill Farrelly for the 70s and 80s and finally Luke Faulkner, Andrew Housego, Caleb Brown and Luke Ferguson for the 2000s. They were on stage with interviews being conducted by Danny Craven. These proved to be an

instructive and welcome interlude with the tales that were told.

For those who were unable to attend the dinner in person, their plaques and booklet have been delivered in the days after the HoF dinner.

Also released on the night of the dinner was the other major enterprise for the club's Centenary Celebrations – an anthology to accompany *The Tigers The History of the Mayne Football Club 1924 to 2011*.

Feel The Roar Mayne Tigers AFC Anthology 2012 – 2023 is a collection of writings and records that cover the years from 2012 to 2023 and rounds out the statistics and the success of this latter period of the MAFC. Feel The Roar fills the gaps but of course does not include the year just completed.

Richard (Dick) Fell was the main collator/author with major contributions from Robert Gower and Russ Ditchburn, especially photos. It also contains team photos for all the teams for the period covered. As well there are some anecdotes from the 1958 Premiership team that provides a section of light-hearted interest. The contribution of the Mayne Juniors AFC and Everton Wolves AFC over the years is recognised in this book.

The Centenary Banner pays homage to the players, people and places that have had a significant place in Mayne's history. Rather than reflect on all these here – take time out to read the two books that cover the Mayne AFC history.

The Hall of Fame is not just about people, it has included the following places and institutions as being worth their place in the history of Mayne:

- Ascot State School a major provider of players to Mayne
- Banyo AFC The Bloods had Mayne players, coaches and in return had a major impact on Mayne through the provision of 25 years of Presidency by 6 Presidents
- Breakfast Creek Hotel raffles for over 50 years the Friday night raffles have provided a valuable source of income for Mayne Senior and Junior clubs
- Crosby Park Vic Walsh Ovel, the centre of the Junior universe for many years
- Enoggera Memorial Reserve, Mayne's home for the past 20 years
- Gardner Vaughan Group major sponsors for around 20 years
- Hamilton Hotel raffles another significant income source for many years

- Mayne Sporting Club, Grafton St, Windsor the best club in town from 1973 to 1997
- Oxenham Park (Toombul Cricket Club), home of the Mayne Juniors
- Perry Park, Bowen Hills, the spiritual home of the Mayne Tigers
- Thompson Street clubhouse, next to Perry Park, home for many years
- Windsor Park (Keith Beavis Oval), the scene for triumphs and disasters

The Hall of Fame dinner was a fitting tribute to the history of the Mayne Tigers and was attended by the widest range of people that have had significant inputs into the history and the well-being of the Tigers over the past 100 years. Hall of Fame inductees in the future will not have such a lavish ceremony but nevertheless will be greeted with similar acclaim as the years pass by. The full list of Hall of Famers is now on the website. The whole of the Mayne AFC should acknowledge the enormous amount of hard work that Shane Johnson and Russell Ditchburn did in compiling the list of Hall of Famers. And then to contact as many of these, or their families as they did to invite them to attend the dinner. This work started almost two years before the dinner was held. Their further effort in compiling the HoF Souvenir Booklet was also a job that took a lot of time. And finally, with the committee, they had a large input into the dinner itself. What an effort from these two stalwarts of the Mayne Tigers.

And now back to the footie! There is a season to complete.

Caloundra couldn't spoil the Centenary party on Reunion Sunday

The AFLQ allowed Mayne to have all four teams play on Sunday to accommodate the activities of the Centenary weekend. The Mayne Tigers AFC thank them for this gesture. In the first game on the Sunday afternoon Caloundra Reserves came out firing on all cylinders but were contained in a first quarter that was reminiscent of last week's ordinary game. But the Tigers were able to shake the shackles and get a few goals to take a lead into halftime. And for the next two quarters they increased their lead to run out well-deserved seven goal winners.

The win was due in no small way to the tight as a drum backline who kept Caloundra scoreless for most of the second half.


